
**Minutes** of a meeting of the Association's Security Committee held on 9 July 2024 from 0900 CEST at the offices of Van Oord, Schaardijk 211, 3063 NH Rotterdam, Netherlands

## 1 Competition law compliance policy

The IMCA Competition Law Compliance Policy, which had been circulated with the meeting agenda, was drawn to the attention of all present.

#### 2 Welcome and attendance

## 3 Minutes of the previous meeting

## 3.1 Approval of the minutes

The minutes were agreed and would be duly signed as an accurate record by the Vice-Chair, as the Chair had sent apologies.

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Nick Hough reported that the HSS Core Committee had held an election, recently completed. He noted that the security committee is an appointed committee, not elected, and is a sub-committee of the HSS committee.

## 4 Joint Industry Security Group – update

Russell Pegg gave a short update on the Joint Industry Security Group of industry trade associations (OCIMF, BIMCO, Intercargo, Intertanko, ICS, IMCA and CLIA).

- A mechanism for delivering maritime security threat advisories was moving ahead. It would tie in with the
  ongoing revision of BMP5 (Best Management Practices to Deter Piracy and Enhance Maritime Security in the
  Red Sea, Gulf of Aden, Indian Ocean and Arabian Sea);
- A draft revised version of BMP5 would be circulated today. The intent was to deliver this in an interactive PDF format and move away, so far as was practical, from paper copies. This would enable faster and more timely update and better version control;
- A meeting of maritime security stakeholders, called by the Secretary-General of the IMO, had been held the
  previous week. IMCA's Margaret Fitzgerald had been in attendance amongst others. The IMO's intent was to
  facilitate better communication and improved messaging relating to maritime security.

## 5 Maritime Security issues

#### 5.1 Red Sea and Gulf of Aden

Members discussed the current threat level in the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden.

- Some seafarers were notably nervous about Red Sea transits and had declined to be on vessels going through the Red Sea;
- What influence might Egypt have on the geopolitical situation in the Red Sea, given the collapse in revenue as a result of far fewer Suez Canal transits in recent times?
- There was no short term resolution or fix foreseen to the threat posed by the Houthi;
- It was reported that a US-flagged container vessel had been attacked that morning, 100 nautical miles SE of Salala in the Gulf of Aden;
- There would be a SHADE Indian Ocean security meeting in Bahrain 16-17 October.

#### 5.2 Ukraine and Black Sea

There was a discussion on the threat of sea mines in the Black Sea, which some members were encountering. There was also evidence of AIS spoofing occurring.

#### 5.3 Venezuela and south America

Members noted the possibility of threats to maritime security arising in Venezuelan waters, off the Orinoco river.

## 5.4 African waters: Mozambique, Gulf of Guinea

The GoG SHADE organisation remained very active although there was no special focus on security in this area at present.

There was an increase in work occurring in Mozambique. There remained a security threat in the area but this was lessened from what it was in 2021. The security threat increased as one moved north from Pemba.

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## 6 Ensuring safe crew changes

Members discussed this, noting that in the context of crew change travel, crews and other corporate travellers were less likely today to openly display corporate logos.

#### 7 Activism

Members noted a possible threat from environmentalist activists in Aberdeen shortly. This was related to "climnate camp Scotland" between 10 and 15 July.

## 8 Cybersecurity

It was not clear which committee within IMCA was responsible for this. Clarification was sought as to the level of priority apportioned to cybersecurity, and how it ought be dealt with. The following points were noted:

- IOGP don't involve themselves with cybersecurity;
- IMCA's involvement ought be limited to the extent to which cybersecurity affected marine contracting. The subject was too big to deal with in its own right;
- Should we only "roadmap" our members to the other great resources in this area, or ought we as IMCA have a position ourselves?
- A draft revised version of the industry document Guidelines On Cyber Security Onboard Ships would soon be available;
- A decision on where cybersecurity ought fall, was asked for.

#### 11 Any other business

#### 11.1 Crew welfare

ISWAN – the International Seafarers' Welfare and Assistance Network – was receiving a very large volume of calls on their "hotline" regarding crew welfare, particularly relating to welfare in the context of security concerns. These calls were largely coming from cargo vessels rather than from IMCA members' vessels. Could there be developed a checklist for vessels with information on crew welfare? This issue would be flagged up to the HSS Core Committee.

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## 11.2 Virtual kidnapping

A member gave a short and interesting update on the practice of "virtual kidnapping", which was occurring more frequently in Latin American countries and in Spain. The threat actor collects detailed personal information about a victim, and then communicates with their family to direct harassment and ransom demand.

Wednesday 23 October 2024, meeting in the morning (this is a change from the previous date of 23/10).

It was suggested that we see if the HSS Core Committee and the Security Committee can be held on successive days, in order to facilitate actual attendance at both by persons on both committees. This would be investigated. It would realistically be Q1 or even Q2 2025.
